NOTA DELLA PRESIDENTE

Dear Members and Friends,

It is my pleasure to serve as President of this Association. I first heard of the AICW as a graduate student. I attended the 1990 AICW biennial conference, in Ottawa, then organized by Francesco Loriggio. The AICW had been founded only four years prior. I have been an active volunteer with the AICW since 1996, having served as Vice-President, Newsletter Editor and Conference Co-organizer. Through this Association I met AICW co-founder Joseph Pivato, of Athabasca University, who encouraged me to publish my first essay on Italian



Canadian writing. In 1998, then president Pasquale Verdicchio gave me my first official role as newsletter editor. It was a lot of work, but it was enjoyable and it put me in touch with many members and writers, building work relationships and friendships and that have lasted more than a decade.

The AICW has seen many changes in the past 20 years. Change is good. If we want an active, forward looking association, we need to involve everyone: established and emerging writers and artists. As you may know, there is a lot of work to be done and we are all volunteers.

The AICW executive, with member volunteers, and its new intern – John Partington from Bishop's University – have been working on various committees for the past few months. We are editing the anthology titled Writing Our Way Home. We have planned an AICW event on April 30th, during the 2011 Blue Met Festival, as well as a May 12th event called Arte Montreal. Our biennial conference is planned for March 23 - 25, 2012, at Dalhousie University in Halifax. (Details will be sent out soon.)

We have also launched a new literary series called Books and Biscotti, with the first event taking place in Toronto on March 23. Events under the "Books and Biscotti" banner will be held across Canada and will be publicized on the AICW website. If you would like to help organize a Books and Biscotti event in your city or town (perhaps by collaborating with other writing groups, cultural organizations, or publishers), please let us know.

At the 2010 AGM, members voted to increase the annual membership fee. The AICW website has been in dire need of a makeover for the past few years. It is hoped that the slight increase will give us the funds necessary to improve the website. If you have not paid your membership dues for 2011, I encourage you to do so by sending in your form (found on page 10) and cheque. Voting members are asked to submit an updated 75-word bio, which will be added to the website.

I would like to extend a warm Welcome to those who have recently become members. Thank you to long-time members who have renewed their commitment to our Association.

On a sad note, Quebec City poet Giovanni Costa passed away on February 3. He was a professor of Italian at Université Laval. Giovanni was a long-time member of the AICW and a good friend. He will be missed by many of us.




SENTIERI DELL'ANIMA: JOURNEY OF THE SOUL By Maria Pia Marchelletta www.inourwords.ca




STRONG BREAD By Giovanna Riccio Quattro Books / www.quattrobooks.ca

In *Strong Bread*, the elegantly crafted works of social and psychological realism, counterpointed with expressionistic and surrealistic textures, employ a language teeming with images, ideas and rhythms. This versatile book of travel poems, portrait, a long dramatic monologue, epistolary, and catalogue pieces will leave the reader emotionally and intellectually gratified.

RANDOM THOUGHTS: POETRY AND PROSE SKETCHES By Marisa De Franceschi Longbridge Books / www.longbridgebooks.com

A welcome addition to Canadian literature, *Random Thoughts* is a collection of short prose sketches which express the often complicated feelings one may have for sons, daughters, husbands, sisters, friends, and the world at large. The sketches are sometimes lighthearted and whimsical, but they can also be poignant expressions of disappointment, disbelief, and distaste for what the writer is witness to. Although the tone may vary from piece to piece, the overwhelming drive and goal is to spotlight situations that will cause the reader to ponder what is really happening beneath the surface. The author's priorities are to entertain but also to encourage a rethinking of our relationships.

"These thoughts may be random, but they cut to the heart of life and allow the truth to bleed out," says author Margaret Haffner. "De Franceschi takes a moment, a feeling, an event and examines it inside and out under a warm, but


oh so probing light. The details of our lives may be different but everyone will find a resonance with her analyses. Her words present a melody of life set to verbal music composed by a master. *Random Thoughts* is a must read that you will return to again and again."

In Penance Is For The Weak – the sequel to City of Sinners – the murky worlds of municipal politics and organized crime collide to weave a tale of corrosive greed, blind ambition and ruthless retribution. Employing a writing style that reveals his shameless devotion to the film noir genre, D. C. Iannuzzi brings the raw emotions of his narrative to the fore through characterization, setting and tone. Iannuzzi earned Bachelor of Engineering and MBA degrees from Concordia University and, when he's not contemplating the darkness that lurks in men's souls, he earns his living as an Investment Advisor and Portfolio Manager. He lives in the former Ville d'Anjou on the island of Montreal with his wife and two daughters.

SWEET LEMONS 2: INTERNATIONAL WRITINGS WITH A SICILIAN ACCENT Edited by Venera Fazio and Delia De Santis Legas

Sweet Lemons 2: International Writings with a Sicilian Accent is a 400-page anthology, edited in Southwestern Ontario, with contributions from close to 90 authors.

Published by Legas of New York, but edited in Canada by Bright's Grove residents and AICW members Delia De Santis and Venera Fazio, the anthology celebrates Sicilian writers, culture, and immigrant experiences and includes the work of a number of award-winning writers.

"Encouraged by the success of the first *Sweet Lemons* anthology published in 2004, co-editor Delia De Santis and I decided a second volume might be equally rewarding," says Fazio. "The first volume sold out. It featured American and Canadian writers, was included on the Best of Sicily web site and was chosen by the magazine Italian America as one of their best picks for summer reading, 2006. For this second volume, the first of its kind, we took advantage of global networking and included not only North American writers but also authors of Sicilian heritage from other English speaking countries

such as the United Kingdom, Ireland, Australia and New Zealand. A few of Sicily's renowned authors, such as Andrea Camilleri, Elio Vittorini and Maria Messina (Medal of Gold, award winner) appear in English translation."

Roughly one-third of the contributors are Canadian and a number of them belong to the AICW. AICW members include Kenneth Scambray (preface), Darlene Madott, Bruna Di Giuseppe-Bertoni, John Calabro, Domenico Capilongo, Anna Foschi, Carmen Laurenza Ziolkowski, Michelle Alfano, Carmelo Militano, Salvatore Ala, Licia Canton, Jim Zucchero, Loretta Gatto-White, Isabella Calalillo Katz and Giovanna M.R. Capozzi.

"Delia and I are also pleased to include the work of two American Book Award winners, Maria Mazziotti Gillan and Daniela Gioseffi as well as a contribution by Inge Israel, who was named Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres (France)," adds Fazio.

"As in the first book, this second volume explores the complexities of a Sicilian heritage. We know, for example, that Sicilians are often painted with a broad Mafiosi brush and that's one of the common myths about Sicilians that both books dispel. Like the first book, we believe this second one will also strike a cord with readers wanting to connect to their Sicilian heritage. For readers not familiar with Sicily, they will discover a unique island with a complex culture and a potent hold over her offsprings wherever they may live."

BEHIND THE YELLOW DOOR By Ilona Martonfi

It is Thursday evening at The Yellow Door and you are hearing poets and prose writers reading from their work. They stand just a few feet away from you. It is as though you are in someone's basement.

As founder, producer and host, I have been running The Yellow Door Poetry and Prose Reading Series since January 1999. I remember that our first reading was standing room only, and it has been great ever since. I enjoy networking and community-building with poets. I also host The Visual Arts Centre Reading Series at the McClure Gallery and co-host Lovers and Others, which will be held this year at Café Sarajevo.

The Yellow Door is home to folk stars, spoken word artists, and poets. Simplicity and hard work keep audiences coming back. Over the years, the coffee house has hosted the likes of Margaret Atwood, Leonard Cohen and Rufus Wainwright.



A typical Yellow Door season runs from August to May and consists of roughly 12 shows. The series receives financial support from the Canada Council for the Arts and The League of Canadian Poets. Twenty-five to 35 people attend our shows. A couple of times a year, we have a full house of about 50. Part performance, part acoustic experience, The Yellow Door always delivers the poetry. The authors' enthusiasm for their work is matched by the appreciative audience. The series has featured talented Montreal poets and prose writers including Governor General award winner Hugh Hazelton, Michael Mirolla, Catherine Kidd, Paul Serralheiro, Stephen Morrissey, Carolyn Zonailo, Endre Farkas, Carolyn Marie Souaid, and others. We have had musicians, as well as writers from out of town.

Sometimes publishers from Ottawa, Toronto, Calgary and Vancouver contact me to book one of their writers. Spoken word artist, Ian Ferrier, who has performed at numerous shows believes that The Yellow Door has been kind to the literary scene. Poet Carolyn Zonailo, who has read at The Yellow Door many times over the past ten years observed that it has a "collective sort of soul feeling."

ITALIAN IMMIGRATION AND OUR DAILY BREAD: A POEM By Maria Luisa Ierfino

I would like to dedicate this poem, "Daily Bread," to Father Tarcisio (Terry) Bagatin of the Scalabrinian Order. He was a Pastor at Our Lady of Pompeii Church when it was first built in Montreal in the late sixties, overseeing the construction and the congregation. A dedicated Scalabrinian for over fifty years he is also a published author, having published collections of poetry and cookbooks.

He now resides in Staten Island, New York, where there is a Centre for Migration Studies, founded by the Scalabrinian Order. It is considered a virtual think tank that supports scholarly research and public advocacy on immigration issues.

The focus of the Scalabrinian Order is to help the migrants around the world feel welcome and "at home." Oftentimes unscrupulous emigration agents would exploit the immigrants within their own countries. Leaving their native land with little or no money, the immigrants did not always speak the language of their chosen country and they would bid farewell to their families and to everything they grew to love.

The Scalabrinians aid the immigrants and their causes and help them "keep the faith." They help them get started in their newly promised land, ensure they have their daily bread and encourage them to live in congregation so they can help each other.

In Montreal, many of the early Italian immigrants congregated in the Goose Village (Goose Village, "u villaggiu" was the area adjacent to the historic Victoria Bridge, near downtown Montreal), and to this day they have a very fond recollection of how they were one united family, grappling with the same daily challenges. They generously helped and protected each other. They lived modestly, but their love for one another, was exuberant.
